The Process



Step 1

Obtain the motor vehicle grand list from the municipality and upload the registration information into our ALPR system.

Step 2



Deploy investigators into the city/town to scan registration plates and enter data into ALPR software to identify all registration plates not currently on the municipality's grand list.



Step 3

Obtain ownership information for the motor vehicles that were identified as not being on the municipality's grand list.

Step 4



Obtain evidence to determine and confirm the identified vehicles owner's residences.



Step 5

Provide the supporting evidence to the municipality so the vehicles can be added to their grand list.

Step 6



Expand tax base by adding more vehicles and retaining **100% of revenue** year after year after our initial percentage fee.
